




Opening Discussion: Participants

Application Process


- First decide which program you would like to pursue and why
- Think about the type of experience you hope to gain while in school
- Have an ideal of what your end goals are after graduation so you can gain experiences to help you meet those goals
- Know the requirements for applying/deadlines
- GRE vs. MAT
- Personal Statement
- Letters of Recommendation
- Writing Sample

Coursework

- Determine if you have any graduate level courses that may transfer
- Balancing work, classes and family/time management skills
- Minimum grade accepted B
- Know the departmental polices, such as Leave of Absence
- Residency requirements
- Take enough classes to prepare you for the type of research study you will pursue
- Write summaries for articles you read on topics of interest
- Comprehensive Examination advancement to candidacy




The Proposal

- Work in consultation with your advisor/chair
- Develop a timeline for completion



- Use research and coursework that may relate to your topic
- Chapters 1 (introduction), 2 (literature Review) and 3 (methodology) of your proposal will make up the first 3 chapters of your dissertation
- Note: The way in which your proposal is organized depends on the department guidelines.



Writing the Dissertation

- This is the lonely phase of the project as you have no pre-determined deadlines like there were while taking classes
- Develop your own deadlines and stick to them writing schedule
- Plan a time timeline with your advisor/chair
- Decide on whether or not to use an editor
- Develop a support group of peers and or family
- Be willing to write and rewrite chapters...it's all about the process
- Don't expect perfection
